





- Decision making group
 - ▶ Provide regular feedback and direction on community priorities to the City and stakeholders
- Application process
- 12-16 BIPOC community members
- ▶ Hold the community organizations accountable to their commitments in the declaration
- Generate broader racial equity goals defined in collaboration with the City and community leadership
- This group was also required by the City's Racial Equity Strategic Roadmap (pg. 8; 30)

▶ BIPOC Community Health Assessment

- ► Goal to identify priority areas for change that would affect health
- More detailed than the data collection done during the strategic planning listening sessions
- Exclusively BIPOC focused, which distinguishes it from other community health needs assessments in the region
- Gives an undeniable, qualitative and quantitative data set on what the community has decided as priority areas for intervention
- ➤ This was also mandated in the City's Racial Equity Strategic Roadmap via Step 3: Goal Setting and Data Disaggregation [by race] (pg. 29; 32)
