

BURLINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT PRIORITY PLAN





INCIDENTS

The BPD classifies incidents according to 130 categories. We further divide those 130 incidents categories into three Priorities.

PRIORITY 1	High priority.
PRIORITY 2	Middle priority. (*) = situationally dependent; some may be Priority 1 or Priority 3.
PRIORITY 3	Low priority. Response may be delayed based on officer availability; may receive a CSO response.

SAFETY. When neighbors call about safety, we will always answer; but other incidents may have to wait—i.e., get stacked—depending on incident volume and staffing. (Priority 2 incident categories with an asterisk may be Priority 1 or Priority 3 depending on whether it is in-progress or a late report, or whether it involves physical safety or not. This determination can be made by dispatch or assigned officers, with the Office-In-Charge as the final arbiter.)

THE SCHEDULE

- This table shows the current "Downtown Tour"
- There are three shifts (Days, Evenings, and Midnights)
- Officers work four ten-hour shifts per week—40 hrs/wk
- Each shift has two alternating teams; the teams overlap on one shift per week, aka "double days"
- The minimum safe staffing on a Day or Evenings shift is typically six plus a supervisor; the minimum on a Midnight shift is typically four plus a supervisor
 - On shifts where minimum staffing is not met, supervisors will post for overtime to ensure a safe number of officers is available
- The "Availability Factor," which is calculated based on officers' contractual leave, means that only 86.3% of officers are available at any given time
- On any given shift, particularly on "double days," headcount is likely to be lower than that shown owing to training, injury, sick leave, or non-contractual time off

OFFICERS AVAILABLE FOR INCIDENTS



DAYS, 0730 x 1730 Seven Officers six with availability factor

We currently have seven officers assigned to our day shift; seven to our evening shift; and four to our midnight shift. The "availability factor" of 0.863, which accounts for contractual leave, means that BPD currently has only six officers regularly available to cover the 44,000 residents and 15.5 square miles of the Queen City. After 3:00 am, that regularly drops to three. Many Priority 1 incidents such as domestic violence automatically require a two-officer response. Resources can become unavailable very quickly.

CSOs AND THE PUBLIC SAFETY CONTINUITY PLAN

One way to address incident volume and staffing is onboarding the new Community Service Officers (CSOs) authorized by the City Council. The CSOs can potentially absorb certain Priority 3 incidents, leaving officers free to address Priority 1 and Priority 2 incidents.

Nevertheless, <u>Hiring and training a CSO takes 7.5 months</u>. The City has posted for the position and already has interested parties. Maintaining hiring standards is nonnegotiable, but we are hopeful that hiring will occur in FY22 Q1, with possible deployment in Q3.

BPD already has two CSOs on staff. They currently respond to about 5% of all incidents. This pilot plan envisions expanding the number of CSOs to twelve and expanding the universe of incidents to which *CSOs can potentially respond to approximately 15-20% of total volume*.
