5. In the first space west of South Winooski Avenue on the south side of Main Street extending for twenty (20) feet from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
6. On the south side of College Street immediately east of Church Street extending 20 feet east from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
7. On the north side of Bank Street eighty-five (85) feet east of Church Street extending forty (40) feet east from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
8. On the south side of Cherry Street immediately east of Church Street extending thirty (30) feet east from 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.

Purpose & Need:

The purpose of this request is to balance parking needs in the downtown core. The need was identified by the Vehicle for Hire Board, the Flynn Theater, and the City's Downtown Parking & Transportation Management Plan: increase public safety of late night taxicab passengers, increase taxicab usage opportunities, improve the locations of taxicab stands, provide access to designated tour bus parking and charging stations, and designate unused parking areas for public use by downtown visitors.

Summary and Conclusion:

Staff received a request in January 2017 from the Vehicle for Hire Board (VHB), asking the existing truck and vehicle loading zones located in the downtown core be designated as taxicab stands during non-loading zone hours. The intent is to increase taxicab usage opportunities for downtown visitors. The VHB believe adding taxicab stands to the downtown core will also increase safety, as most of the late night taxicab passengers will be patrons from downtown bars. DPW Staff attended a meeting in June which included leadership from VHB, staff from the City of Burlington Attorney's Office, and Parking Enforcement. The City Attorney's Office and Parking Enforcement are agreeable with the proposed dual use of loading zones and taxicab stands. As a result of the meeting and information collected and analyzed, DPW Staff recommend existing taxicab stands be removed and replaced with new taxicab stands that are shared with existing loading zones. In addition, DPW Staff recommend metered parking be installed in place of existing taxicab stands, with the exception of South Winooski Avenue (where meters already exist) and Church Street (which may be evaluated after hearing feedback about these parking changes in this area).


This idea is totally not acceptable. I am just wondering who's brilliant idea is.

As we enter Year 2 of the Sustainable Infrastructure Plan to reinvest in Burlington's infrastructure, one of our goals is to keep you informed.

We are writing to let you know that DPW is undertaking a series of significant, coordinated projects to upgrade and invest in aging municipal infrastructure along Maple St (between Battery and St. Paul) and Pine St (between Main and Maple) beginning in April and lasting through much of summer. We will be hosting a public meeting (please RSVP to DPW Public Information Manager at rgoulding@burlingtonvt.gov, or 802-540-0846) to discuss these projects and their impacts and address any questions you may have. This will be held on March 14 at 5:30pm at the Bobbin Mill Community Room at 245 Pine St. These projects will lead to renewed and revitalized infrastructure that will serve Burlington residents and visitors for a long time. We thank you for your patience during the construction season.

Overview

The projects consist of 3 water main upgrades (one on Pine between Main and Maple; and two on Maple between Battery and St. Paul), a new traffic signal and pedestrian signals (at Battery and Maple) and paving work on Maple (between Battery & St. Paul). We do expect construction zones to transition to local traffic only on and adjacent to the projects with some temporary parking loss, and are proposing some temporary parking additions to help mitigate these impacts. More information is below.



Summary and Conclusion:

During the planning phase for the 2018 construction projects, a need to temporarily increase parking opportunities for local residents and business was established by staff due to the temporary loss of parking along Maple Street during construction. Staff collected data on several streets in the local area and believe adding temporary parking on South Champlain Street and Pine Street will relieve pressure from the construction in the affected neighborhoods.

If the parking spaces are authorized during construction on South Champlain Street from King Street to Maple Street, the travel width along this block of South Champlain Street will be 15 feet wide. The existing conditions along Pine Street prohibit daytime parking on the east side of Pine Street from Maple Street to the driveway at 226 Pine Street and also prohibits parking to 266 Pine Street (ReSource). Due to the narrow travel width along South Champlain Street and existing traffic regulations on Pine Street, once 2018 construction operations are complete all traffic regulations will revert back to what existed prior to construction.



Re: Authorization and approval of Series 2018 Water System Revenue Bonds

Date: March 14, 2018

The City of Burlington (the “City”) plans to issue its Water System Revenue Bonds, Series 2018 (the “Bonds”) in the principal amount of not to exceed \$2,000,000 secured by a pledge on the revenue of the City’s Waterworks System. The Bonds constitutes a portion of the \$8,344,000 of revenue bonds approved by the voters of the City at a special meeting held in November, 2016. The Bonds would be issued under a supplemental resolution to be adopted by the City Council and would be the second series of bonds under the City’s Water System Revenue General Bond Resolution adopted May 1, 2017 (the “General Bond Resolution”). The General Bond resolution was adopted in connection with the issuance by the City in June 2017 of the \$3,250,000 Water System Revenue Bonds Series 2017.

Paul Frank + Collins P.C. is Bond Counsel for the transaction, and is providing this memorandum to address (i) what authorization and approval the Public Works Commission (the “Commission”) is considering with respect to the issuance of the Bonds and (ii) the provisions of the City’s Charter that provide the authority to the Commission to take such actions. We look forward to the opportunity to discuss the authorization and approval and any questions you may have at the Commission’s March 21, 2018 meeting.

I. Authorization and Approval of the Bonds.

The Commission has been provided a resolution (the “Commission Resolution”) for its consideration for the authorization of not to exceed \$2,000,000 of Revenue Bonds under the General Bond Resolution. The Commission and the City Council previously approved and authorized the General Bond Resolution in 2017.

The Commission Resolution takes the following actions: (i) approves the issuance of the Bonds under the General Bond Resolution, (ii) finds such issuance to be in furtherance of the public interest, and (iii) identifies that the proceeds of the Bonds will be used to finance the capital improvements authorized by the voters at the November 2016 special meeting.

II. Authority for Authorization and Approval of the Bonds.

The authority for the Commission to approve the issuance of the Bond is §507 of the City's Charter, which provides that:

The [waterworks or wastewater revenue] bonds may be authorized by resolutions of the Board of Public Works Commissioners. Notwithstanding the foregoing sentence, no bonds other than refunding bonds shall be authorized or issued under this article unless and until more than 50 percent of the legal voters of the City present and voting thereon at any annual or special City meeting duly warned for that purpose shall have first voted to authorize the project or improvement for which the bonds are to be issued.

The authority for the Commission to approve the creation of the reserve funds created under the General Bond Resolution and any Supplemental Resolution is §65(a)(2) of the City's Charter, which provides that:

The City Council, with the prior approval of the Board of Light Commissioners or the Board of Public Works Commissioners, as applicable, shall have authority to create and establish, maintain, build up, and increase from year to year from the earnings of such Department and Divisions, special reserve funds for such Department and Divisions, to be kept by the City Treasurer in a separate bank deposit and in a separate account for each Department and Division and to be used only to pay for such expenses as the Electric Light or Public Works Departments may recommend and the City Council may approve and authorize.

The Debt Service Reserve Fund and the Renewal and Replacement Fund created and funded under the General Bond Resolution and any supplemental bond resolution could be considered special reserve funds under §65(a)(2), and therefore require the prior approval of the Commission before the City Council may create the same.

Debt service reserve funds are customarily established for revenue bond financing. A debt service reserve provides a back-up source of funding to make debt service payments in the event that revenues are not sufficient to make timely payment of principal and interest due.

For the City's Water Revenue Bonds, the Debt Service Reserve Fund may be funded in part with the proceeds of the Bonds. The minimum balance of the Debt Service Reserve Fund is an amount to be determined prior to issuance of the Bonds. It will not exceed 10% of the bonds or maximum annual debt service on the Bonds or 125% of the average annual debt service on the Bonds.

The Renewal and Replacement Fund is a separate fund established to provide a source of funding for unplanned or extraordinary costs or to replace facilities or equipment. It was authorized and initially funded at the time of issuance of the Series 2017 Bonds.

The authority for the Commission to approve the issuance of the Bonds is a combination of Charter provisions §507 and §65(a)(2). The City Council will need to act to approve a Supplemental Resolution under the General Bond Resolution for authorization of the Bonds.

The final terms of the Bonds, such as the dates, maturities, principal amounts, interest rates, interest payment dates, principal payment dates, redemption provisions, the amounts of proceeds of the Series 2018 Bonds (not to exceed \$2,000,000) and Revenues to be deposited in the Debt Service Reserve Fund, inclusion of provisions for bond insurance, if beneficial to the City, will be approved by Ms. Beth Anderson, as Interim Chief Administrative Officer, or Mr. Rich Goodwin, as Director of Financial Operations. If the average true interest cost of the Bonds is greater than 5.0%, the City's Board of Finance will be required to approve the terms of the Bonds.

RESOLUTION

Be it Resolved, as of March 21, 2018, by the Board of Public Works Commissioners of the City of Burlington, Vermont (the “City”) as follows:

Section 1
Authorization

The Board of Public Works Commissioners (the “Board”) hereby authorizes the issuance of revenue bonds in a principal amount not to exceed **\$2,000,000** to provide for the financing of capital additions and improvements to the waterworks system (the “Water System”), including (i) capital improvements to the City’s underground pipe and water distribution system, water mains, services, valves and hydrants, (ii) to fund a debt service reserve fund, and (iii) pay costs of issuance of such revenue bonds. The Board deems the issuance of revenue bonds as hereby authorized to be in the public interest.

At the Special City Meeting of the City, held November 8, 2016, the voters of the City authorized the issuance of Revenue Bonds in one or more series in a combined aggregate amount not to exceed \$8,344,000 to finance and carry out such capital improvements to the Water System (collectively, the “Project”).

Pursuant to such vote, and the City Charter, and upon the recommendation of the Board, the City adopted a General Bond Resolution dated May 1, 2017 (as amended and supplemented, the “General Bond Resolution”).

The City has issued \$3,250,000 Water System Revenue Bonds, Series 2017 pursuant to the General Bond Resolution. The City has not issued any other revenue bonds under the General Bond Resolution to date.

The Series 2018 Bonds (the “Series 2018 Bonds”) are to be issued pursuant to a Supplemental Resolution, to be adopted by the City Council. It is estimated that the Series 2018 Bonds will be payable, by serial maturities, sinking fund installments, term bonds or a combination thereof, in the years 2019-2039, both dates being approximate, as may be approved by the City Council.

Section 2
Authorization of Series 2018 Bonds

The Board hereby approves to be issued a Series of Bonds designated “Waterworks System Revenue Bonds, Series 2018” in the total principal amount not to exceed **\$2,000,000**. The Series 2018 Bonds shall be issued for the financing of capital additions and improvements to the waterworks system, including (i) capital improvements to the City’s underground pipe and water distribution system, water mains, services, valves and hydrants, (ii) to fund a debt service reserve fund, and (iii) pay costs of issuance of such revenue bonds. The Series 2018 Bonds shall

bear interest at the rates per annum and shall mature on such dates as specified in the Supplemental Resolution adopted by the City Council.

The Board hereby further approves the issuance of the Series 2018 Bonds and the funding of the Renewal and Replacement Fund as determined in connection with the issuance of the Series 2018 Bonds.

Section 3

Certain Findings and Determinations

The Commissioners of the Department of Public Works hereby finds and determines as follows:

(a) The City issued \$3,250,000 Water System Revenue Bonds, Series 2017 pursuant to the General Bond Resolution on June 6, 2017. No other bonds have heretofore been issued under the General Bond Resolution.

(b) There are no outstanding bonds, notes or other evidence of indebtedness payable from and secured by a lien or charge upon the Net Revenues pledged under the Resolution other than (i) the Water System Revenue Bonds, Series 2017, and (ii) the prior obligations consisting of a note issued by the City to the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation Clean Water State Revolving Fund in the original principal amount of \$228,006, which is payable from the Net Revenues pledged under the Resolution.

Section 4

Award of Bonds; Official Statement; Further Action

The City's Chief Administrative Officer (including Interim Chief Administrative Officer), the City's Director of Financial Operations, and the Director of Public Works are, and each of them hereby is, authorized either singly or together:

(a) to execute and deliver an underwriting agreement, bond purchase agreement, or contract of purchase negotiated with a financial institution engaged to underwrite, market and sell the Series 2018 Bonds (the "Underwriter") with respect to the Series 2018 Bonds, in such form as the signing officer shall approve;

(b) to prepare, make public, execute and deliver to and authorize distribution by the Underwriter to prospective purchasers and investors of a Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Series 2018 Bonds;

(c) to prepare, make public, execute and deliver to and authorize distribution by the Underwriter to prospective purchasers and investors of an Official Statement substantially in the form of the Preliminary Official Statement after the same has been completed by the insertion of the interest rate and other data with respect to the Series 2018 Bonds and by making such other changes or corrections as the signing officer or officers may approve, such officer's or officers' execution to be conclusive evidence of such approval;

(d) to execute and deliver a Continuing Disclosure Undertaking substantially in the form attached to the Official Statement, with such changes or corrections as the signing officer or officers may approve, such officer's or officers' execution to be conclusive evidence of such approval;

(e) execute a Series Certificate evidencing determinations or other actions taken pursuant to the authority granted hereby, and such Certificate shall be conclusive evidence of the action or determination of the Chief Administrative Officer (including Interim Chief Administrative Officer), or Director of Financial Operations of the City and the Director of the Department of Public Works as stated therein, which Series Certificate shall specify the following, which are to be determined in the discretion of the Chief Administrative Officer (including Interim Chief Administrative Officer), or Director of Financial Operations of the City and the Director of the Department of Public Works, subject to the authorization and restrictions contained in this Resolution:

- i. To determine the aggregate principal amount of the Series 2018 Bonds, in an amount not to exceed the amount authorized under the section captioned, "Authorization" hereof, and to determine that the proceeds to be derived from the issuance of such Bonds;
- ii. To determine the maturities and maturity amounts of each of the Series 2018 Bonds;
- iii. To determine which Series 2018 Bonds are to be designated as Serial Bonds and which Series 2018 Bonds are to be designated as Term Bonds, and to determine the sinking fund requirements for any such term Bonds;
- iv. To determine the interest rate or rates for the Series 2018 Bonds; provided, however, that if the average true interest cost rate on the Series 2018 Bonds is to exceed 5.00% as determined by the City's Chief Administrative Officer (including Interim Chief Administrative Officer), the issuance and sale of the Series 2018 Bonds shall be subject to the approval of the City's Board of Finance;
- v. To determine the redemption provisions of the Series 2018 Bonds in accordance with the provisions of Section 4 and Section 5 hereof,
- vi. To determine the dated date of the Series 2018 Bonds;
- vii. To determine the date or dates of sale and issuance of the Series 2018 Bonds;
- viii. To determine whether the Series 2018 Bonds, or any portion thereof, shall benefit from the issuance of a insurance policy or other form of credit enhancement; provided, however, that in making such determination, Chief Administrative Officer or Director of Financial Operations of the City and the Director of the Department of Public Works shall be entitled to rely upon a certificate or certificates of the Underwriter to the effect that the present value of the premium paid to obtain the such credit enhancement is less than the present value of the interest reasonably expected to be saved as a result of having such enhancement, using the yield on the Series 2018 Bonds (determined with regard to the premium paid for the such enhancement) as the discount rate for this purpose; and

- ix. If a form of credit enhancement supports the payment of the principal of and interest on all or a portion of the Series 2018 Bonds, to accept provisions which are a condition precedent to the issuance of the form of credit enhancement to the extent such provisions are not inconsistent with the Bond Resolution.
- (f) to execute such other documents, enter into such covenants and take such other actions as are necessary or advisable to effect the issuance and delivery of the Series 2018 Bonds and the application of the proceeds thereof in accordance with the provisions of this Resolution.

LOWER DOWNTOWN CAPITAL PROJECTS:

We are gearing up for a number of coordinated capital projects in the southern portion of our downtown. Projects include:

-) Signal upgrades at Battery St & Maple St
-) Water main upgrades on Maple St (Battery to St Paul)
-) Water main upgrades on Pine St
-) Streetscape reinvestment on St Paul St (Main to Maple)
-) Repaving Maple St and Pine St

Given all this work, we've developed a coordinated communications effort. You can see some of it on our project webpage: <https://www.burlingtonvt.gov/DPW/Reinvestment/Lower-Downtown>. To mitigate impacts, we're proposing a number of temporary parking measures that are on this month's agenda. We've also been hosting multiple meetings in the neighborhood.

2018 CONSTRUCTION SEASON:

We're gearing up for another big season of infrastructure reinvestment. We've asked each NPA for the opportunity to present the season's projects at their March or April meetings. We're updating the construction portal for the year's work: <https://www.burlingtonvt.gov/construction>.

DESIGNING DOWNTOWN STREETScape IMPROVEMENTS:

Using the Great Streets Standards that the DPW Commission recently approved, we are preparing to upgrade key downtown corridors. St Paul Street from Main to Maple will be upgraded this season. Utilities will be buried. Sidewalks will be widened. Rain gardens and engineered tree pits will ensure robust vegetation. We are also beginning the design work for the blocks of Bank Street and Cherry Street that are west of Church Street. We expect to bring initial concept plans to the April Commission in addition to other public meetings that month to get feedback on the designs.

WATER BILLING UPDATE:

We have completed the DPW / KPMG compound meter in-field assessment. We are compiling our findings, double-checking our calculations and preparing our comprehensive memo for the Commission and City Council. It is vitally important to us that we have a complete, thorough and accurate report to present, so we appreciate the Commission's patience as we prepare for a full presentation at the April Commission meeting.

PERMIT REFORM:

We've launched an on-line trades inspection scheduling service. We are exploring categories of trades work where we could not require permits or allow a level of self-certification due to the limited life safety risk presented by those activities. Thank you to Chair Archambeau for his ongoing service on the Permit Reform Advisory Committee.
