26 WHEREAS, the Burlington School District has retained a Superintendent who is French-English
27 bilingual, who worked in bilingual school systems in Canada, and who has expressed the desire to introduce
28 innovative bilingual elementary instruction in our schools; and

29 WHEREAS, the Church Street Marketplace has helped to design and fund a cart in coordination with
30 Alliance Française that provides information to French-speaking visitors on Saturdays during the summer and
31 fall; and

32 WHEREAS, the Church Street Marketplace works with Alliance Française to provide opportunities for
33 employees of businesses in the downtown area to take French language classes;

34 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that, for the continued benefit and enrichment of the
35 regional culture, economy, and opportunity on both sides of the international border, the City of Burlington
36 will continue to accommodate French-speaking natives and visitors wherever practical; and

37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the progress by City of Burlington departments on
38 accommodation of French language speakers since the 2011 resolution be acknowledged and continued; and

39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that public informational signage created and maintained by the City
40 of Burlington include French translation and universally accessible wayfinding symbols as signage is updated
41 and replaced; and

42 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Burlington School Department be encouraged to pursue a pilot
43 French-English bilingual immersion curriculum in at least one elementary school; and

44 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the lessees of the city-owned public information installations on
45 Church Street and the Waterfront be encouraged to staff their facilities with French-speaking staff; and

46 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Burlington retail and hospitality businesses are encouraged to
47 affirmatively hire employees with French language skills, and are encouraged to support existing employees to
48 acquire and enhance such skills; and

49 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Burlington will continue to partner with the Alliance
50 Française and other local groups and institutions to increase opportunities for French language and cultural
51 education.

RE: Resident Parking Management Plan (RPMP) Update

In 2015 the RPMP was completed and a memo was presented on the implementation plan. Since that time, some implementation has been delayed due to staff turnover, competing work, and other City projects. The RPMP identifies strategies that should be implemented incrementally. This is a brief summary of the near-term implementation plan.


Summary:

The Department of Public Works (DPW) staff is working with the City Attorney's Office and the Burlington Police Department on developing ordinance language to bring to the Commission for approval. The ordinance language changes are based on recommendations from the RPMP. Staff are anticipating presenting these recommendations within the next three months. Some of the key revisions Staff are developing for Resident Parking Permit (RPP) streets deal with the following:

1. What the cost structure will be for eligible residents to purchase a RPP.
2. Clarify eligibility for residential permits within existing RPP streets, specifically for corner lots.
3. Define the number of permits RPP eligible residents may apply for.
4. Specify the number of contractor permits a resident may request on an RPP street, and how long those contractor permits are valid for.
5. Define acceptable documents to prove residency on a RPP designated street, section of streets or abutting corner parcel.

There are RPP related traffic requests in queue, including requests which are specific to RPP and corner lot eligibility, a request on existing time restrictions for RPP on a designated RPP street, and a request from a Burlington Resident to increase public parking opportunities on existing RPP streets. Staff will look to evaluate these traffic requests once the Commission approves the ordinance language for RPMP recommendations and changes.






Sidewalk Scoring Pattern—Running Board




