

City of Burlington, Cannabis Business FAQs

September 2022

Below is a list of frequently asked questions related to operating a cannabis business in the City of Burlington.

<u>General</u>

1. Are cannabis establishments allowed in Burlington?

• Yes, all license types are allowed in the City of Burlington. Per state law, municipalities only have discretion over whether to allow cannabis retailers within their borders. On Town Meeting Day 2021, Burlington voters voted affirmatively to <u>allow cannabis retailers</u> in the city and in August 2022 Burlington City Council voted to establish a local cannabis control commission.

2. Will there be a cap on the number of licenses within the city?

• No, neither the State nor the municipality will be capping the number of licenses. Municipalities are prohibited from capping the number of licenses.

Opening a Cannabis Business

3. What do I need to do if I want to open a cannabis related business in Burlington?

- You should contact the <u>Department of Permitting and Inspections</u> early in the process of planning for a cannabis business to ensure that your business is opening in a permitted location and to determine what local approvals will be needed. This <u>project questionnaire</u> will provide you with an overview of needed City approvals based on your business license type and location in the city.
- Separately, you should review information on the State Cannabis Control Board's website regarding opening a cannabis business. Review application requirements carefully as some Burlington-issued permits (i.e. fire marshal review) may be needed to fill out a complete state application.
- Once your state license application has been approved by the state's Cannabis Control Board (CCB), your application will be forwarded to the City of Burlington as per the <u>State Application Process</u>.
- The final approval prior to operating in the City of Burlington is an approved license from the City's cannabis control commission. You will be notified by the City Clerk's Office when the City has received notice from the state CCB of your state license approval, and provided with instructions to fill out a local license application and attend a meeting of the city's Cannabis Control Commission.
- 4. Can businesses obtain local permits (i.e. zoning) for an establishment before they have a state license?
 - You may rent a space and obtain zoning and trades permits at your own risk.
 - Burlington's local cannabis control commission cannot approve a license for your operation until your State Cannabis Control Board application has been approved and forwarded to the City.

Location Restrictions & Local Permitting Requirements

5. Where can I open my cannabis related business?

- Cultivation, manufacturing, testing and wholesale businesses may open where the city is zoned for such activities. See the sections on Zoning and Water Resources below for guidance, and direct questions to applicable City departments to ensure the suitability of a location you're exploring.
- Retail establishments may open in areas of the city that are zoned to allow retail. However, Vermont's <u>Drug Safe</u> <u>School Zones law</u> prohibits retail sales within a 500 ft. area around a K-12 school when they're on properties adjacent to or across the street from the school facility.
 - NOTE: Please consult this map of applicable schools and properties currently utilized for school purposes. If your location falls within one of the blue buffer areas, carefully review whether it is on a property that shares a property line or is directly across the street from a school use. You must ensure the location will not be in violation of state law.

6. How will my cannabis business be categorized under the City's Zoning ordinance?

- Carefully review the City's <u>Comprehensive Development Ordinance</u> for any applicable regulations for your location or establishment type. In particular, review the <u>map of zoning districts</u> and <u>allowable uses</u> within these districts.
- In general, the table on the next page summarizes how state licenses are reviewed under city zoning rules, and provides a basic summary of where each license type is generally allowed in Burlington.
 - NOTE: This information is provided only as a general reference. You <u>must</u> consult with the Dept. Of Permitting & Inspections to ensure that your business meets these use definitions and that the location you are considering is a permissible location.
- Within the city's downtown zones (FD5 & FD6, see map of zoning districts), street-level windows facing the public sidewalk or street must be clear and unobstructed to an interior depth of 8 feet. The windows cannot be frosted or otherwise obstructed except with operable sunscreens or limited window signs as allowed by the zoning regulations. The rules of the VT Cannabis Control Board prohibit visibility of cannabis products from outside a retail establishment. Compliance with these rules may require retail cannabis location above street level, or if on street level, interior product placement or screening at least 8 feet from the windows into the building interior.
- Contact the <u>Dept. Of Permitting & Inspections</u> to ensure your business type is allowed in its location, and that the location is in compliance with VT's Drug Safe School Zone law.

7. What Water/Wastewater Permitting requirements are there for cannabis businesses?

Burlington Water Resources supplies all domestic water, and provides wastewater & stormwater collection and treatment services to the City. Applicants should contact the Water Resources Division as early as possible in the process to prevent any undue delays. Water/Wastewater Capacity Allocation

Flow demands for new construction, redevelopment, or changes in use for an existing space often require evaluation to ensure ongoing compliance with State and Local regulations. Cannabis operations can range widely in their processes, and it's important that we understand how the business will be utilizing water and wastewater resources so we can ensure the system is serving you appropriately – and prevent any undue impacts to the collection system!

- Backflow Prevention Review Backflow prevention devices protect the drinking water distribution network from possible contamination from individual water service connections. This can sometimes occur if there is a water break or some other event that causes the pipes to lose pressure, causing a sort of "siphon" effect on individual services.
- FROG Protection Review (Fats, Rags, Oils, and Grease)

• Industrial Waste Review

Burlington wastewater facilities function through a complex ecosystem of microorganisms, which are critical to the wastewater treatment process. Like any living thing, these organisms are susceptible to sudden, extreme changes in their environment. It's important that we understand what products, chemicals, etc. Your business may be flushing into the sewer to ensure the long-term health of our wastewater plants.

• Water Meter Sizing & Installation Review

This is not just for new development – in cases where a business is moving into an existing space, we still need to obtain an up-to-date fixture count to confirm the water meter is sized properly for the proposed use.

Business Licensing/Taxation questions

8. Will there be any additional municipal taxation on cannabis?

- All retail cannabis establishments will need to collect the City's 1% local option tax. Per VT law, no additional local tax will be imposed.
- 9. How much is a municipal cannabis license?
 - The state has set the cost of a local license at \$100 for application and renewal. The applicant will pay this directly to the state as part of their state license application process, and it will be remitted to the city on an applicant's behalf.

10. Is there any technical support available for new businesses?

Appeals

11. Can permits and licenses associated with my business be appealed or revoked by the City or my neighbors?

- Neighbors and other stakeholders may be eligible to appeal, intercede, or request review of permits or licenses based on their relationship to the business premises. Procedure varies by type of permit or license.
- Non-parties who wish to have a decision of the Local Cannabis Control Board reviewed may petition for review by the Vermont Superior Court in accordance with Court Rules.
- 12. If my local cannabis control license is conditioned, denied, or revoked, can I appeal a decision of the Commission?
 - Yes. You may appeal a denial or revocation of your local cannabis control license by the Burlington Local Cannabis Control Commission to the Vermont Superior Court in accordance with <u>Vermont Rule of Civil</u> <u>Procedure 74 (Appeals from Decisions of Governmental Agencies)</u>. Please note this only applies to local denial or revocation of your license.
